- 1. Call to Order @ 5:15 PM

- 2. Evan moved adoption of the agenda
 - a. Sandra added review of goals (as advertised in original "invitation to join" the committee)
 - b. Gary added: Focus on fewer topics
- 3. Sandra moved approval of the Minutes for 9-27-2023
- 4. Items for Discussion
 - a. Business/trade skills incubation
 - i. Evan provided significant details about the Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP)
 - 1. How his company does it and info about how other businesses do
 - 2. Discussion with Westwind (W/w) superintendent
 - a. Unlike other divisions, W/w has no coordinator.
 - 3. We think we should move fwd here by discussing with Inge and getting permission to approach the Parent council.
 - a. Inform about RAP and the "Try a Trade"
 - i. Offer, if desired, to organize a "Try a Trade" orientation night for parents & interested high school students
 - ii. Career and summer employment potential
 - b. How we can adapt it to Stirling
 - i. Using a school secretary to do the basic registration paperwork?
 - ii. Class schedule adaptations needed/desired when/if RAP is implemented.
 - ii. Evan, Sandra & Gary will identify all the tradesmen/businesses within Stirling area
 - 1. To discover what opportunities may exist for the students apprentices
 - a. As we started to "think out loud" we were surprised at how many there are
 - b. Tourism challenges
 - i. How to leverage what we currently have
 - 1. A brief "SWOT" analysis spontaneously occurred, based on some inside info about a current challenge one "destination" is experiencing
 - a. Needs and intervention/assistance possibilities were briefly discussed
 - i. Each of us will reach out as opportunities allow
 - ii. Resurfacing old basketball court and repurposing it for pickleball courts would cost about \$30,000



- 1. Popular activity

- 3. may attract people to visit and play, as well as to be used by our own citizens
- 4. Lions have enough casino money to just about cover the cost
 - a. But they think new ones (at about 5 times the cost) may be a better, long term/more cost effective solution

 - i. Incentives to look for places and ways to work/serve more cost effectively
 - 1. Cost/benefit (independent) analysis
 - ii. Clear performance expectations
 - iii. Measurable results
 - iv. Free up funds for other uses
